

AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY

- 1619: First slave ship comes to Jamestown from Africa. Slavery continued in some parts of the country until 1859.



- Millions of slaves worked on plantations in the South.
- 1820: Harriet Tubman is born as a slave. She later leads many slaves to freedom on the Underground Railroad.



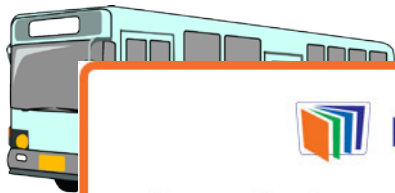

- 1852: Dred Scott v. Sandford is a landmark Supreme Court case. It ruled that African Americans cannot be a citizen.
- 1862: Emancipation Proclamation given by Abraham Lincoln frees the slaves.
- 1865: Thirteenth Amendment is ratified. This outlaws slavery in the U.S.
- 1908: Thurgood Marshall is born. He later became the first African American to serve as a U.S. Supreme Court justice.



- 1909: NAACP is formed. (*National Association for the Advancement of Colored People*)
- 1920s: Harlem Renaissance—many black poets, writers, and artists had lots of success.
- 1936: Jesse Owens, an African American track star, won 4 gold medals at the Berlin Olympics.
- 1954 *Brown v. Board of Education*. Supreme Court decided that segregation of schools is not Constitutional.
- 1955: Rosa Parks would not give up her seat in a bus to a white man. This led to the Montgomery Bus Boycott. Because African Americans were so upset by the arrest of Rosa Parks, they refused to ride any buses.

- 1957: The Supreme Court ruled in *Shelby County v. Holder* that the rights of African Americans were protected by the 14th Amendment.
- 1963: Martin Luther King, Jr. gives his "I have a dream" speech to a huge crowd.



- 1965: African Americans wanted the right to vote. Martin Luther King, Jr. led a 54-mile march to Alabama to try to gain this right.
